The Greater Kasai Region of the DRC is facing a complex humanitarian crisis which began with a violent uprising of local armed groups in August 2016.

The Kasai crisis has generated enormous humanitarian needs across all sectors. People urgently need food, water, sanitation, shelter and relief supplies. In addition there is a lack of sexual and reproductive health support and very little protection from gender-based violence as well as services for survivors.

CARE's Response

With 1 in 4 women having experienced sexual violence in Eastern DRC, CARE works to support survivors of sexual violence. We are training medical personnel, prepositioning medical supplies and provide key information for survivors via radio messages. We aim to reach 225,000 people with food, cash, water, hygiene kits, latrines and support on sexual and reproductive health as well as for survivors of sexual and gender based violence.
