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#### FOREWORD

After a two year break in production, CARE International is pleased to be able to present its annual "Topography Report" for the year ending June 2006. The Topography Report attempts to provide a snapshot in time of CARE International's country offices around the world, the work they do, how much money they spend, and how many people they employ.

The information it presents has been drawn from the annual country office programme information collection process (the CARE Programme Information Network, or C-PIN), and the financial information systems of CARE International members.

So what does the report tell us? It tells us that in fiscal year 2006 that the 12 CARE International members were active in 67 countries and territories, other than their own. This work was implemented through 60 country offices around the world, by 14,800 staff, the great majority being of local origin. Altogether, CARE International spent US\$ 700,263,575 on its development, rehabilitation and emergency relief programmes during fiscal year 2006. Of this amount US\$ 577,736,772 was used to fund 1,169 projects in 16 primary sectors, while US\$ 122,526,803 was provided in the form of agricultural commodities. Forty-three percent of CARE International's total spending was allocated to Africa, 34 percent to Asia, 17 percent to Latin America and the Caribbean, and 6 percent to the Middle East and Europe. The greatest number of projects, 469, was found in Africa, compared to 358 in Asia, 245 in Latin America and the Caribbean, and 97 in the Middle East and Europe.

These are impressive statistics, and in detail reveal an international confederation that continues to enjoy scale, global reach and considerable portfolio diversity. What they are unable to provide, however, is an answer to that most fundamental inquiry: how many people does CARE help? In large part this absence is a reflection of how difficult it has become to specify with certainty what are often termed "project beneficiaries". As CARE has become more focused in recent years on addressing causes of poverty and injustice, as well as their effects, the notion of "beneficiary" as a direct recipient of project outputs and outcomes has become somewhat outmoded. How, for example, do we apply the concept to a project that has as one of its objectives change to national legislation that will affect access by certain vulnerable groups to health care? Clearly it is not easily done.

One of the challenges for future topography reports, therefore, will be to provide a better description of the people CARE International serves through its programmes. We will also seek to become more consistent in the way we classify our programmes into different sectors of activity, so that the topography paints a more complete picture of CARE's work. In doing so the report will start to achieve its true purpose, which is to contribute to CARE International's greater transparency and its accountability to constituencies and stakeholders.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the efforts of a number of staff who contributed to the preparation of this report. Mainly thanks are due to the Secretariat's Elizabeth Kemf, who led the entire production process and in doing so put in hours above and beyond what would normally be expected. Thanks also to Clark Efaw in CARE USA for his valuable support in C-PIN data sorting and management, and to Aurelie Lachant and Tanya Vieke-Sussman during report drafting and compilation. Finally, a special vote of appreciation goes to Le Gong (Cage) and to Raisa for their valuable contributions.

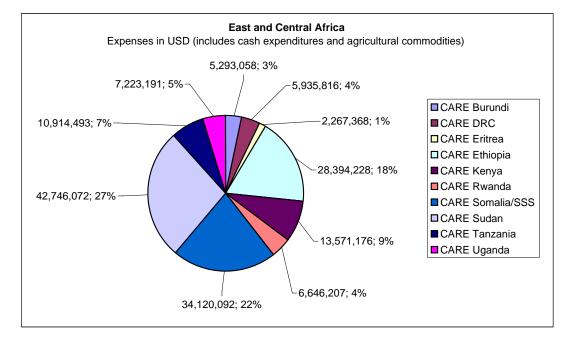

**CO Summary :** CARE started working in Burundi in 1994 to help those affected by civil unrest. Its initial programs focused on distribution of non-food items to internally displaced people and returning refugees in the northern part of the country. During the following years, CARE managed refugee camps inside the country and across the border in the eastern Democratic Republic of Congo. Burundi has by now successfully conducted democratic elections at all levels across the country. The new government faces many challenges, including rebuilding the infrastructure, the economy, governance structures and fostering a climate of trust amongst the population. The government, which has prioritized a decentralized decision making structure, has promoted the role of women in governance with 30% of elected officials being women.

**CO Summary :** CARE worked temporarily in eastern DR Congo (then Zaire) from 1994 until 1998, providing assistance to Rwandan refugees. It closed its program at the end of that refugee crisis. In response to a deteriorating humanitarian situation, a CARE International country probe and assessment was conducted in late 2001. This led to a CARE decision to establish a long-term presence in the DRC starting in early 2002. A relief, reconstruction and development program is being set up in the areas of peace-building, health, economic recovery and micro-enterprise.

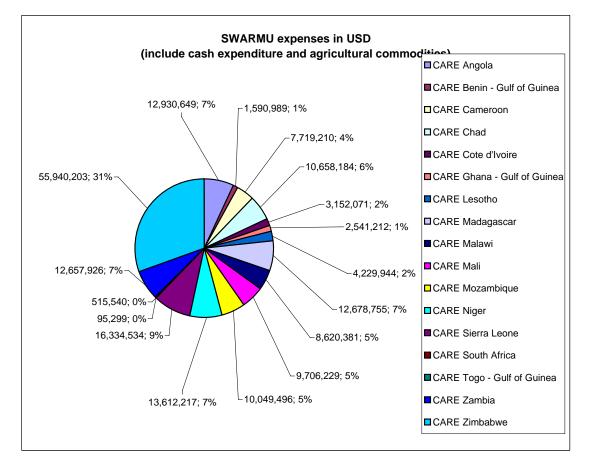

The two-decade conflict ultimately killed or wounded hundreds of thousands of people, displaced another 1.2 million people, destroyed towns and cities, severely damaged the economy and left huge tracts of farmland untended and unproductive; the Lusaka Protocol, signed by Angolan Government and UNITA rebel forces on November 20, 1994, brought only an uneasy peace. Drought, the presence of 15 million landmines, and the collapse of traditional distribution and trading networks have left large segments of the population without access to basic goods and services, including food, clean water and health care. Despite periodic political instability, CARE Angola has been able to evolve from mostly emergency-based activities to rehabilitation. Projects currently include: mother-child health; water and sanitation; landmine education awareness, mapping and clearance; and restoration of the agricultural and marketing sectors.

#### CO Summary :

CARE International in Jordan was founded in 1948 to provide relief services to post-war refugees by offering food assistance shelter and medical attention in both the East and West banks of the Jordan River. During the Gulf crisis in 1990, CARE provided assistance to the returnees and evacuees from the Gulf area. Operations in Jordan are focused on demonstrating innovative pilot projects using participatory community development approaches partnering with local communities and government institutions. CARE is also encouraging women to become more independent by helping them to make small investments, for example in livestock or tools, which in the long run will increase their family's income. Ninety-one per cent of Jordan is situated in an arid or semi-arid zone where farming is a very precarious way to make a living. CARE's work in Jordan focuses largely on improving communities' access to water. A CARE project, aptly named EMPOWERS (Euro-Med Participatory Water Resources Scenarios) is working directly in Jordan, Egypt and the Palestinian Territories of West Bank and Gaza to help improve access to water.
